

Dr. David Farwig is a professional vocalist, conductor and clinician who has devoted his life to working with choirs. He has served as clinician and consultant for a wide variety of ensembles from high school to church choirs and professional choirs, including the U.S. Air Force Singing Sergeants (D.C.), the Santa Fe Desert Chorale, and the St. Martin's Chamber Choir (Denver, CO). Dr. Farwig was the artistic director of the Alpine Chorale in Arvada, CO, and the assistant conductor of the Conservatory Choirs at the University of Missouri's Conservatory of Music in Kansas City, as well as a visiting professor of music at the University of Denver's Lamont School of Music where he taught undergraduate and graduate choral conducting, choral literature and music history. Dr. Farwig is a professional concert vocalist, engaging in solo and choral performances throughout the United States and Europe with organizations such as the Carmel (CA), Oregon, and Victoria Bach Festivals (TX); the Santa Fe Opera and the Santa Fe Symphony (NM); the Baroque Chamber Orchestra of Colorado; the Colorado Bach Ensemble, and the St. Martin's Chamber Choir (CO); Choral Arts Northwest (WA); Seraphic Fire (FL); and True Concord Voices and Orchestra (AZ). Dr. Farwig was nominated for the prestigious Austin Critics Table Award in Austin, Texas, for his solo work in Robert Kyr's A Time for Life and won the same award for his solo performances in Samuel Barber's The Lovers, recorded by the Grammy[®]-winning professional ensemble, Conspirare, on the Harmonia Mundi label. Other acclaimed recording projects include John Michael Trotta's The Seven Last Words of Christ, and Robert Kyr's Cloud of Unknowing: Songs of Soul. He was voted as one of NPR's top picks for new recordings.
